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Background to Victoria Park

Victoria Park is a 130ha park of tree lined avenues and large open spaces located just to the west of central Ballarat and is bounded by Gillies Street, Sturt Street, Russell Street and Winter Street.

Victoria Park is an important open space asset for the community now and for future generations being one of the best examples of large, European style parkland in Australia. The City of Ballarat is planning for projected population growth of 45,000 people by 2050, and Victoria Park is a significant asset to contribute towards Ballarat's liveability into the future.



Victoria Park consists of:

- 13 sporting ovals, 5 soccer pitches and 2 cricket practice nets
- 1 clubroom building shared by cricket, soccer and the dog obedience club
- 2 ornamental lakes
- a 5km shared walking & cycling trail
- 2 playground / picnic areas, one with a public toilet
- an equestrian precinct

The landscape of Victoria Park comprises areas of significant volcanic grassland plant species as well as seasonal displays of native orchids and lilies. A pine plantation in the south eastern corner provides a contrast to the structured avenue and perimeter tree plantings. A network of meandering tree lined roads provides separation between the various zones of the park. A giant mullock heap (Mt Holled – Smith) reminds us of the park's former mining activities.

Background to the Use of Spaceshaper

Spaceshaper is a consultation tool that was developed in the United Kingdom with funding and support from the British Government and a number of professional associations. It is a practical toolkit that measures the quality of a public space before investing time and money in improving it. Spaceshaper captures the views of professionals who are running the space as well as those of the people that use it. Facilitated workshops discuss the results, various aspects about quality and design and how the space works



for different people. At the conclusion of a Spaceshaper workshop, a number of thoughts have been recorded about how that space can be improved to be of greater value and benefit to the community.

When Spaceshaper was first developed it was primarily a tool that would be used with adult stakeholders and it was soon realised that its application for young people was limited. The professionals who developed Spaceshaper then came up with an additional tool – Spaceshaper 9-14, that uses more practical activities and interactive methods to effectively engage with children and young people.

By using both Spaceshaper and Spaceshaper 9-14 for young people as well as adults, feedback on the same eight key themes that are embedded in the Spaceshaper tool can be recorded and compared across the age groups. In this way, the input and contributions made by children are more valuable than other isolated methods that might be used.

For the application of Spaceshaper to the Victoria Park, the workshops were designed to:

- engage with a range of adults and young people who have an interest in Victoria Park;
- identify how the feedback provided by young people might have differed to that provided by the adults;
- understand how Victoria Park currently performs to meet a wide range of community expectations;
- facilitate a greater understanding between key stakeholders about opinions and priorities; and
- examine how this important public open space can be improved.

How the Spaceshaper Workshops were run

Spaceshaper (9-14)

Spaceshaper sessions were conducted at Loreto College and Urquhart Park Primary School to provide an opportunity for children in the age range of 9-14 years, to have input into the visioning process for the future of Victoria Park.

The planning of this session involved the City of Ballarat making contact with key teachers / Principals of the two Schools and seeking agreement to visit a class of students at each school during a normal school day. The classroom teacher was consulted prior to the workshop to plan for the session and was briefed about the format and role they could play.

Workshop Wednesday 2nd May, 2012

The first Spaceshaper (9-14) session was conducted at Loreto College in a Year 7classroom on Wednesday 2nd May from 9.50am until 12.50pm. 24 year 7 students were present for the workshop and the group of young people comprised all girls aged 12 years (17) and 13 years (7). The workshop was conducted by a trained facilitator with

assistance from six year 9 students at the College, a staff member from the City of Ballarat and two classroom teachers. (The students and teachers rotated throughout the workshop.) The school day format was used to plan the activities with morning recess being used to input the data into the Spaceshaper software and lunchtime being the completion time of the session.

When asked about their familiarity with Victoria Park, the young people responded to the following frequency of visiting this park: In the summer:

- 4 people come to this park every day;
- 8 people come to this park once per week;
- 4 people come to the park once per month;
- 4 people come to the park less than once per month; and
- 4 people have never visited the park in summer.

In winter:

- 5 people visit this park every day;
- 3 people visit this park once per week; and
- 6 people visit the park less than once per month; and
- 9 people never visit the park in winter.









Workshop Thursday 3rd May, 2012

The second Spaceshaper (9-14) session was conducted at the Urquhart Park Primary School in the grade 6 classroom on Thursday 3rd May from 10.00am until 1.20pm. 30 grade 6 students were present for the workshop and the group of young people comprised 11 year olds (8 boys and 10 girls) and 12 year olds (4 boys and 8 girls). The workshop was conducted by a trained facilitator with assistance from four clients (staff from the City of Ballarat) and the classroom teacher. The school day format was used to plan the activities with morning recess being used to give the children some free time in Victoria Park and lunchtime being the completion time of the session.



When asked about their familiarity with Victoria Park, the children responded to the following frequency of visiting this park:

In the summer:

- no one comes to this park every day;
- 7 people come to this park once per week;
- 6 people come to the park once per month; and
- 17 people come to the park less than once per month

In winter:

- no one visits this park every day;
- no one visits this park once per week; and
- 6 people visit the park once per month;
- 21 people visit the park less than once per month; and
- 2 people never visit the park in winter.

The format for the two workshops was as follows:

- Welcome and introductions
- Explanation about the workshop, why it is being held and a brief introduction about Victoria Park
- Completion of initial activity: who I am (age/gender) and a Bingo Activity as an ice breaker and to start children talking about the park
- Site visit to Victoria Park, involving a short walk each way and group discussions at the park.
- Voting on the 8 questions that respond to the themes of the Spaceshaper program
- Activities in groups with students rotating around the tables:
 - Who Am I and Describe It Activity, commenting about who uses the park and how well cared for it is;
 - o Rate this Space, commenting on photographs of the park and other places
 - Write a postcard activity children writing to a friend inviting them to the park and describing why they would like to share a visit / Activity spotter children used dots to show the activities they might engage in when visiting the park
- Discussion about the results and drawing a vision for the park and/or how the park could be improved to achieve a higher result for the specific questions
- Activity to vote on the importance of some of the initiatives that emerged from the vision activity
- Evaluation activity, thank you and close

The feedback from all students about the workshop was generally very positive with:

- 8 Students from Loreto College saying they 'loved' the workshop (32%);
- 13 enjoying the workshop (50%); and
- 5 saying that is was 'OK" (18%).

The activities that the students from Loreto College enjoyed the most (in order of the most popular) were:

- Giving opinions about the park;
- Walking to and visiting the park;
- Activities that required rotating around the tables;
- Everything!; and
- Looking at the photos.

The activities that some of the students from Loreto College enjoyed the least included:

- Looking around the park because it was so cold;
- The writing activities;
- Good space/Bad space;
- Bingo;
- Activity Spotter;
- Who am I?; and
- Watching the computer.

When the students from Loreto College asked if they felt that they were listened to:

- 20 said 'Yes' (77%); and
- 6 said 'Maybe' (23%).

The students from Loreto College were then asked if they felt that their views would make a difference to what happens in Victoria Park, they responded:

- 12 said 'Yes definitely' (46%);
- 13 said 'Maybe' (50%); and
- 1 said 'Not sure' (4%).

Finally, when the students from Loreto College were asked if they learnt anything new during the workshop, the following responses were given:

- I learnt how big Victoria Park actually is and some things I didn't know about it, like it has a lake and a velodrome and is larger than Lake Wendouree (13 responses)
- I learnt the long grass around the park is native grass (3 responses)
- I learnt that there is a lot to change from the past (1 responses)
- I learnt that our actions can affect the future generations of Ballarat and Victoria Park (1 response)
- I learnt what a great place Victoria Park will be when it is done (1 response)
- I learnt that Victoria Park is important (1 response)
- I learnt that Victoria Park needs more stuff (1 response)
- I learnt about important things we need in our park (1 response)
- I learnt that community is important (1 response)
- I learnt about other people's opinions (1 response)
- I did not learn anything new today because I am very familiar with the park (1 response)

The students at Urquhart Park Primary School were also asked the same set of questions and responded as follows: The feedback from the children about the workshop was generally very positive with:

- 17 saying they 'loved' the workshop (57%);
- 12 enjoying the workshop (40%); and
- 1 saying that is was 'OK" (3%).

The activities that the children at Urquhart Park Primary School enjoyed the most (in order of the most popular) were:

- Walking to and visiting the park;
- Everything!;
- Giving opinions about the park;
- Activities; and
- Writing a postcard.

The activities that some of the children at Urquhart Park Primary School enjoyed the least included:

- The 'ideas' sheet.
- Voting;
- Writing the letter;
- The worksheets; and
- The surveys.

When asked if they felt that they were listened to:

- 23 said 'Yes' (77%);
- 6 said 'Maybe' (20%); and
- 1 said 'Not sure' (3%).

The children at Urquhart Park Primary School were then asked if they felt that their views would make a difference to what happens – they responded:

- 15 said 'Yes definitely' (50%);
- 12 said 'Maybe' (40%);
- 2 said 'Not sure' (6%); and
- 1 said 'Don't think so' (3%).

Finally, when asked if they learnt anything new during the workshop, the following responses were given:

- How we can make Victoria Park a better place x3
- Victoria Park is 300-400 acres x2
- That what we think, helps Victoria Park x2
- There used to be squirrels at Victoria Park
- All about Victoria Park
- We should keep parks clean
- To help the community
- Victoria Park does not need much change
- Victoria Park is not so bad after all and I think I will go there more often
- How Victoria Park runs in different ways
- Victoria Park is going to be improved
- Victoria Park needs improvement
- Names of trees
- Nature-life is awesome
- Nothing really



Spaceshaper (Senior)

A Spaceshaper session was held with a range of adult stakeholders with the primary reason of seeking input into the visioning process for Victoria Park. This workshop also provided an opportunity to utilise the same themes that were used for the Spaceshaper 9-14 workshops so that there could be a comparison of the results.

Workshop Thursday 10th May, 2012

The Spaceshaper workshop was conducted at the Robert Clark Centre in the Botanic Gardens, Ballarat. Due to the diminishing daylight at 5.30pm and large size of Victoria Park, it was decided not to walk to or drive around the site. Because most workshop participants were very familiar with Victoria Park, a number of photos of the site were used for a 'virtual' site tour.

25 adults attended the workshop from a range of organisations and as general residents. Representation from groups such as Sporting Clubs, Schools, Dog Obedience, Council, Environmental Groups, National Trust and a Developer provided an excellent range of opinion.

The format for the Spaceshaper session was as follows:

- Arrival, welcome and introductions.
- Introduction to the Workshop.
- Ice breaker 'Bingo' activity was conducted.
- Virtual site visit and discussion using photographs
- Completion of Spaceshaper Questionnaires.
- Activities to provide further thoughts about the performance of Victoria Park, how the park is valued by the community and what the attributes of good and bad open spaces are.
- A personal reflection / letter to someone about Victoria Park in 20 years from now.
- Presentation of questionnaire results.
- Discussion about the data and results.
- Conversation about a Vision and Priorities for improving Victoria Park.
- Voting on the suggestions for the park: Very Important / Not so Important
- Thank you, Close and Departure

Spaceshaper responses are grouped under eight key headings that reflect three themes:

How well the space works:

- 3. Other People

The space itself:

- 5. Environment
- 6. Design and

The difference the space makes:

Key Results and Discussion

Spaceshaper 9-14: Loreto College


Spaceshaper utilises a resource kit to run a hands-on workshop of fun activities for children that prompts their responses to the same set of questions that Spaceshaper (Senior) is based on. However, instead of a 41 question survey, participants in Spaceshaper 9-14 vote on each of the eight questions after participating in a range of activities that raise awareness about the site.


The following is taken directly from the software results and shows the questions that were asked of the students and the responses they provided. The results were presented in two different ways, firstly as a bar chart summarising all questions and responses (below) and secondly as scattergrams with individual bar charts that pictorially reflect the voting process.


It is evident from the bar chart above that Victoria Park being important to the local community was more significant than any other question asked, followed closely by the park being easy to get around and being a really nice place to be. Victoria Park performed the lowest in response to the question about the park being comfortable in day and night and in all weathers. Scattergrams for each individual question are:


Victoria Park: Access: Is this space easy to get around?







Victoria Park: Environment: Is this space safe and comfortable in the day and night, in all weathers?
















For the purpose of analysis of the questions and direct comparison to the other Spaceshaper 9-14 and Senior workshops, the Loreto College Spaceshaper 9-14 results are also reflected as a sider diagram, shown below.



From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Access' scores quite well:

The students' voting revealed general agreement that Victoria Park is easy to get to and get around. This aspect of the park received the second highest rating of all the eight questions. The park is relatively flat with roadways and pathways entering from most directions and with road frontages on basically all sides was identified by the students as relatively easy to access. These students considered the park to be more accessible than the students at Urquhart Park Primary School and very similar to the response given at the senior Spaceshaper workshop.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Community' scores very well:

The students' voting revealed that they believe that Victoria Park is important to the local community. This aspect received the highest rating of all the eight questions. This achieved similar results to the primary school students and the senior Spaceshaper program and seemed to reflect that the students understand the value of public space for themselves and for the broader community.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Other People' scores low:

While half of the student group thought that Victoria Park is popular with lots of different people, the other half considered it not to be popular. This is a different result to the responses from the children at Urquhart Park Primary School who responded more positively to this question, as also did the senior Spaceshaper workshop.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'You' scores quite well:

Victoria Park was identified by the students as a space that they largely felt was a nice place to be. They generally liked the openness, amount of shade, range of facilities and pathways in the park. This question scored almost as high as the primary school children and similar to the senior Spaceshaper participants.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Use' scores low:

There were mixed responses to the question of 'lots to do here', with a majority responding that there are not many things to do in the park. It is interesting that the girls thought the park was generally a nice place to be but the range of activities does not match this response. Combined with the value placed on the park, an emerging trend is that young people would use the park more if they felt that there was more for them to do. This trend is similar to the primary school students as well even though their general response to this question was a little more positive. The senior spaceshaper workshop rated this aspect of the park quite a bit higher which may be a reflection of adults' views of the suitability of Victoria Park for various types of activities.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Maintenance' scores average:

The student group was divided on the question of maintenance of Victoria Park. Anecdotal comments during the site visit suggested that the park was poorly maintained – it is possible that discussion about the park may have prompted thinking about natural and bushland environments. This result is similar to the primary school students whereas the senior spaceshaper workshop revealed a lower rating for maintenance.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Environment' scores very low:

The students' voting and discussion revealed that the park is safer and more comfortable in daylight hours and when the weather is pleasant. This question received the lowest rating of all eight questions and was similar to the primary school children, while the senior spaceshaper workshop rated environment slightly higher.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Design and Appearance' scores average:

The students' voting in response to the question: "Has this space been well designed and made?" was average and the observations were that the park has magnificent trees and shade, but falls short in aspects like facilities and shelter. The primary school children rated this aspect quite a bit higher, as did the adults in the senior Spaceshaper workshop.

Spaceshaper 9-14: Urquhart Park Primary School


The same process was used with the students at Urquhart Park Primary School with the following summary outlining the results when the same eight questions were asked following a visit to Victoria Park.



It is evident from the bar chart above that Victoria Park being important to the local community and being a really nice place to be were equally the highest rating factors of Victoria Park for the children. Victoria Park performed the lowest in response to the question about being comfortable in day and night and in all weathers.










Victoria Park: Environment: Is this space safe and comfortable in the day and night, in all weathers?






Victoria Park: Maintenance: Is this space clean and well looked after?










For the purpose of analysis of the questions and direct comparison to the other Spaceshaper 9-14 and Senior workshops, the primary school Spaceshaper 9-14 results are also reflected as a sider diagram, shown below.



From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Access' scores low:

The children's voting revealed general indecision about whether Victoria Park easy to get to and get around. The class were virtually divided in their voting. This is reflected in the bar chart with this question being one of three that scored low. This response is also significantly lower than the results from the other two spaceshaper sessions and could reflect the location of the school being towards the southern and less developed end of the park. The site visit to Victoria Park focused on the ponds, playground and open areas where infrastructure provision is more sparse and maybe a lower standard.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Community' scores very well:

The students' voting revealed that they believe that Victoria Park is important to the local community. This aspect received the equal highest rating of all the eight questions. This achieved similar results to the Loreto College students and the senior Spaceshaper program and seemed to reflect that the children understand the value of public space for themselves, their families and for the broader community.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Other People' scores relatively well:

The children generally thought that Victoria Park would be popular for lots of different people. This result was higher than the Loreto College students and a little lower than for the senior Spaceshaper workshop. During the site visit, the children saw people walking dogs and using the park and discussed the range of people that they thought would use the park – general positive responses were recorded (anecdotally).

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'You' scores very well:

The students voting revealed that they think that Victoria Park is a really nice place to be. This aspect received the equal highest rating of all the eight questions and scored higher than both the Loreto College students and the senior Space shaper workshop. It was clear as the site visit proceeded, that the children were very positive about the ponds, the green and open qualities of the park and the playground.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Use' scores quite well:

The children's voting results indicated that even though they agreed that Victoria Park is a nice place to be, they were not so positive about the range of things that they could do in the park. The children were a little more positive about the park than the students from Loreto College and their response was similar to the senior Spaceshaper workshop. During the activities they came up with a range of ideas about how the park could provide more things for them to do.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Maintenance' scores low:

Questions concerning maintenance and presentation of Victoria Park received a mixed response from the children with the group being divided on this question. The result is similar to the students from Loreto College and higher than the feedback from the senior Spaceshaper workshop and possibly reveals some different expectations about how Victoria Park should be maintained.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Environment' scores low:

The students' voting and discussion revealed that the park is safer and more comfortable in daylight hours and when the weather is pleasant. This question received the lowest rating of all eight questions and was similar to the students from Loreto College, while the senior spaceshaper workshop rated environment slightly higher.

From the spider diagram, the issue of 'Design and Appearance' scores well:

The children's response to the question of design and appearance generally received a positive result, possibly reflecting an appreciation of the natural qualities of Victoria Park given that the site visit focused on the southern area of the park. This result was higher than the Loreto College students and similar to the result from the senior Spaceshaper workshop.

Key Results and Discussion –

Spaceshaper (Senior)

The results from the senior Spaceshaper workshop sessions have been collated in this section.


Participants were firstly asked to list the things they like most about Victoria Park and the things that they dislike about the park. At the end of the questionnaire, the same questions were asked again, to give respondents the opportunity to add to these lists having considered all aspects of the park in responding to the questionnaire. The following is a summary of these responses:





The results of the 41 questions in the questionnaire are shown in the spider's web diagram on the right. The solid black line shows the results for Victoria Park. The dashed line shows how each of the eight issues would be rated in an average space. Results better than average are outside the dotted line and results less than average are inside it.

Overall Victoria Park scores just on average for Maintenance and above average for Other People, Use, Access, You, Environment Community and Design and Appearance. The results shown to the right are for the whole group of participants at the workshop, whereas below, the two spider diagrams show results for two different groups.



Results of feedback from different stakeholder groups:




The results above show the spider diagram again but this time with the participants divided into those who responded that they feel that they have a say in how the park is run as those that don't feel that they have a say. From the groups of Residents, Park Users and Council representatives, the following numbers comprise these two responses:

The participants who feel that they have a say in Victoria Park were more critical of Access and Maintenance and scored Use a little lower to the other group (who have no say in the park). Other results were quite similar between the two groups. The following split of results three ways shows the different stakeholder groups and how they responded to the survey questions.

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From the three spider diagrams above, the following brief observations are made:

- Access is rated slightly higher by park users and residents than the Council representatives.
- Use is rated highest by park users (predictably) and lowest by residents.
- The theme of Other People in Victoria Park received the highest result from park users (again predictably) and the lowest response by Council.
- Maintenance was scored lowest by residents and similar by the other groups with park users rating it just slightly higher.
- Design and appearance and the environment of the park was rated virtually the same by all three groups.
- The value of Victoria Park to the community was rated slightly higher by park users and the same by residents and the Council representatives.
- The value of Victoria Park for individuals was rated very similar for both residents and park users and slightly lower for Council representatives, although the results are all still very positive.

From the questionnaire results, the following statements received the most positive responses, in order of popularity:

- 1. This is an important place to the local area
- 2. The place is easy to find
- 3. I can get here easily
- 4. This place is in a good spot
- 5. I enjoy being in this place

As a contrast, the following statements received the least positive responses, in order of lowest results:


- 1. This place has good lighting (lowest score)
- 2. There is shelter from the weather
- 3. I can learn new things here
- 4. The people who look after this place are around a lot
- 5. This place is good for local shops and businesses

The highest scoring statements sit sin the themes of Community, You and Access, that all received relatively good results overall. By comparison, the lowest scoring statements sit in the themes of Environment, Maintenance and Use, that all showed lower overall results. The comment about local shops and businesses in part of the Community theme and may reflect some difference of views among the participants and might explain the slightly lower result for Community compared to Access and You.

Level of importance and performance of Victoria Park in meeting expectations

The bar chart above shows the same eight headings as in the spider diagram, but this time as a reflection of the level of importance that each theme has compared with how the space is performing. The grey bar indicates how important everyone thinks the theme is (with the small black line indicating the 50% mark of the grey bar). The red bar indicates how everyone feels Victoria Park is performing, allowing for a comparison between these factors.

The same results are shown in the following bar charts to compare results for the people who feel they have assay in the park and those who don't.



The three charts that discuss importance and performance of Victoria Park reveal the following key observations:

Victoria Park falls short of meeting expectations in all of the factors that were the subject of questions and discussion. This result suggests that there is quite a bit of room for improvement particularly in the area of maintenance where overall performance was equal to or less than half the rating of expectation.

You:

This theme rated quite well when the expectation was compared to the level of satisfaction. The people who feel that they don't have a say have a higher expectation of Victoria Park in this area, but all respondents are generally in agreement about Victoria Park performing quite well.

Community:

Equal highest level of importance overall, this theme received a higher level of importance from the people who have a say in the park than the people who don't. However, it is interesting to note that Victoria Park is performing about the same in meeting expectations for both groups, above 50% but still falling well short of optimum performance.

Design and Appearance:

Design and appearance received an average rating for expectation overall and this rating was significantly higher for the people who have no say in the park than the people who do have a say. Victoria Park is meeting about 75% of its expectation in this area, which is one of the higher results. While there is room for improvement it appears that the residents and users that comprise the group who feel they have no say in the park are generally more satisfied with the design and appearance of Victoria Park than the other mixed group (with higher representation from Council).

Environment:

Environment rated reasonably high in expectation for all respondents (and higher for the group that felt they had no say in the park) with results indicating that it falls reasonably short of stated expectations. It is important to note that the questions about Environment asked about shelter, times of year to use the park, lighting, clean air, noise, feeling safe and the size of the space. The results recorded in this workshop were higher than the Spaceshaper 9-14 and it is noted that the students were questioned mainly about visiting the park at different times of day and night and in all weather, which was more limiting than the senior session. It is reasonable then that for a space like Victoria Park, the adult respondents would rate Victoria Park higher.

Maintenance:

Park maintenance rated high in importance and the lowest in performance with the people having no say being significantly more critical and with lower expectations than the group that have a say in the park. It was unanimous that maintenance is a key issue that needs to be addressed in any future planning and decision making.

Other People:

How Victoria Park caters for the needs of different people rated similar in performance by both groups however the people that have a say in the park have higher expectations about how the park caters for various users and uses. This was considered a reasonably important factor overall with performance sitting just under 75% of expectations.

Use:

The equal highest result for importance overall, the benefits and activities offered by Victoria Park were rated higher by people who have no say in the park with actual performance falling shorter than the group who have a say in the park. These results were similar to the primary school children and higher than the students from Loreto College.

Access:

Access to and through Victoria Park rated average compared with the other factors and had the equal highest level of satisfaction compared to expectation (as the You theme). The difference between importance and expectation was the closest for the people who have no say in the park of any other theme. This suggests that Victoria Park is performing reasonably well in the area of access, although some improvements are still expected.

Activities

In addition to the questionnaire and data entry, a number of activities were conducted to seek a range of comments and feedback from participants about Victoria Park.

Activity 1: What people think about Victoria Park (Senior Spaceshaper)

For this activity participants were asked to jot down their thoughts about how they currently use Victoria Park and what they might like to do in the park in the future. The responses are summarised as follows:

What I like to do here

- Plan enhancement of the natural environment
- Enjoy open space
- Savor the trees
- Play soccer
- Walk
- Walk the dog
- Cycle
- Enhance equestrian precinct further
- Ride horses
- Observe natural flora and fauna
- Fish with the grandchildren

What I would like to do here

- Eat from an edible forest
- Community vegie garden
- Outdoor cinema (temporary)
- Music festival (portaloos no infrastructure needed)
- Arts festival
- Enjoy open space
- Savor the trees
- Various cycle routes
- Play soccer with better facilities
- Learn about native grassland vegetation
- Run around a restored velodrome



Activity 2: A Future Vision for Victoria Park – A Personal Reflection (Senior Spaceshaper)

This activity asked the participants to write a postcard that would be opened by their 'grandchildren' or someone in 50 years' time. This is a reflection of what one would wish the park to be for the people who will use it in the future. The following table outlines these reflections:

"I would like to see the park left essentially as it is with a few more upgrades of play areas and buildings. I would also like to see an area in which the public could walk their dogs off-lead – maybe fenced (this would need to be very large so that the public feels safe and the dogs do not interfere with each other)."

"To look at – not too much different to Victoria Park as it is today – maybe more ponds, rotundas, less cars. Used more – temporary events e.g. festivals and more people walking in it and playing in it year round."

"Still a public open space with open park-like vistas. A wide variety of spaces for a range of community activities – sport, passive recreation, walking, nature observation. A variety of different environments – introduced trees, native-indigenous vegetation, wetlands. A habitat for native fauna."

"Please don't change it too much. Let's keep the open spaces and its semi regulated nature e.g. an English common, not an overdeveloped park."

"A place of tranquility, open spaces, trees, sport, wetlands with water birds, <u>NO</u> commercial developments, some food/drinks available at Sturt Street side, better access to park at Gillies Street i.e. near Leopold Street, more diverse 'off-road' walking/cycling tracks."

"The park should stay as is, but with an upgrade to building (existing) to more suit the existing user groups."

"A more balanced use of the park, meaning better sporting facilities for structured sports such as soccer, cricket and other sporting clubs."

"No further permanent commitments (buildings, car parks, roads). The park should look much the same as now, but with enhanced natural environment."

"For my grandchildren I would like the open spaces to remain large without built boundaries. The tree park and ponds will provide easy access to nature and natural environs. Victoria Park will remain a place for free play – balls, bikes, running and self-expression. Informality is essential to maintain a free feel."

"My vision for Victoria Park for the next 50 years – to maintain the 1880's vision and to not decrease the area size. Very important to maintain native grasslands. As much multi-use as possible."

"I would like Victoria Park to be a place where there are still avenues of mature trees, areas where the current sports (50 years on) can be played by organized groups and spontaneously, where all ages can interact with nature/environment e.g. walk, run, dig, hide, built with natural materials e.g. tree houses, where the original vegetation is visible and still an area that has less than 0.1% covered in building."

"Dear Future Resident (50 years' time, 2062) – I would like to see Victoria Park as a widely acknowledged regional park which is utilised by all ages and cultural groups. The park provides a variety of quality, well maintained, active and passive recreation precincts, with examples of nature and European flora representing the history of the region before and after settlement. The park has some leading edge landscape treatments and world best practice in sustainable park management."

"Victoria Park in the future, an inner city park in the centre of the city, used by a range of community groups, a site for events and community activities."

"A safe space, with obvious places – each with their own unique character – but one united space. A well designed park that changes with the seasons, where plants that are selected won't struggle with current/future conditions. Has the facilities required to meet peoples' needs."

"To keep improving facilities for families to run wild. Keep caring for and planting more beautiful frees. To continue to make equestrian precinct one of Victoria's finest."

"Vast open spaces, well maintained, with strong community participation and ownership. A place to feel safe, have a strong community spirit through activation of unique and diverse spaces. A place with a proud history and a secure future."

"In 50 years I would like to see the park develop into areas for sporting commitments, and more native plants to encourage native flora and fauna."

"Victoria Park linked with Lake Wendouree via a park e.g. land swap Loreto oval with Parks in VICPARK. Major sports precinct both outdoor and indoor with indoor sports to be located on sale yards and outdoor sports built in southwest corner e.g. new ovals, skate park, tennis courts, BMX track, triathlete bike track, etc, etc.



Activity 3: A Collective Vision for the Future (Senior Spaceshaper)

Once the personal reflection had been written by individuals, they were asked to share their thoughts with their group so that each of the five groups developed a 'collective' vision for the future of Victoria Park and what improvements might be required. The groups developed the following 'visions':

While the overall results for each of the groups (senior Spaceshaper and Spaceshaper 9-14) differed, there were some common themes as indicated by the spider




diagrams (below) that summarise the key responses to the eight themes that Spaceshaper is based on.

Generally Victoria Park is rated highly for its value to the community and to individuals and it is considered reasonably well designed and made. Young people are more crictical of its environment and comfort at different times of day and year than adults and children find the park more difficult to access than teenagers and adults.

There are mixed views about the range of activities that Victoria Park offers and how valuable the park is for various people.

There is general agreement that maintenance is an issue in Victoria Park and improved maintenance may results in greater use from a community that highly values the spaces within the park.

Victoria Park is popular for a range of formal and casual recreation activities and most suggested improvements recognise the values of the park in its current layout. Minimal change to the design of the park is desired, with some improved infrastructure and management strategies to enhance the recreation experience for park users. Interpretive signage and installations that reflect the rich history of Victoria Park were suggested with a general concensus about preserving and improving trees and landscape throughout the park.

Overall these Spaceshaper sessions raised many comments and opinions about how Victoria Park could be improved so that it is a significant open space parkland for future generations to enjoy. The suggestions contained within this report will be combined with feedback gathered from surveys, interviews, workshops and submissions to develop a vision for the future of Victoria Park.
